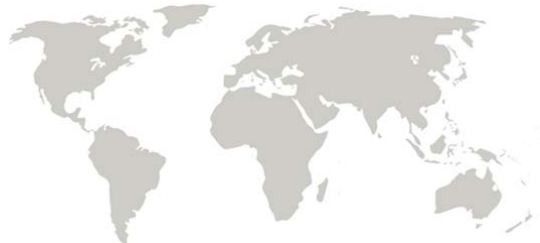

Ascobat Gani

Center for Health Economics and Policy Analysis
Faculty of Public Health, Universitas Indonesia

Ascobat received his medical degree from the Faculty of Medicine, Universitas Indonesia in 1975. In 1978, he received his Master's in public health from the School of Public Health at University of Hawaii and his Diploma on Community and Social Development from Chicago University. He also obtained his doctoral degree in public health from the School of Hygiene and Public Health at Johns Hopkins University in 1982. In 1996, he acquired a Managed Health Care and Health Insurance Certificate from the Health Insurance Association of America. He served as a member of Senior Advisory Group for Public Health Education, SEARO from 2004 to 2006 and a temporary advisor in a number of consultative meetings on Health Economics, WHO-Geneva and SEARO, etc.



Becky Freeman

University of Sydney

Becky Freeman has been working in the field of tobacco control since 2000. She is an early career researcher and Ph.D candidate at the School of Public Health, University of Sydney. Her research interests include tobacco advertising and promotion and the influence of Web 2.0 technology in both promoting and reducing tobacco use. The primary focus of Becky's Ph.D thesis, which was submitted for examination in March 2011, is on the tobacco control implications of the increasing popularity of electronic media and social networking websites. She is the Associate Editor of New Media for the international journal, *Tobacco Control*.



Bambang Wispriyono

Faculty of Public Health, Universitas Indonesia

Bambang Wispriyono is a Pharmacist (UI, Indonesia 1992) with a Ph.D in Environmental Toxicology (UOEH, Japan 2001), and a post doctoral degree from Wayne State University (Detroit, USA 2002). In 2007, he became a Jasso research fellow. Dr. Wispriyono is currently a lecturer at the Department of Environmental Health, Faculty of Public Health, Universitas Indonesia (FPHUI). He served as the Vice Dean of FPHUI from 2004 to 2006 and was appointed Dean of the Faculty in 2008 till 2012. His research interests are risk assesment of hazards, tobacco and health impact, drug and food control, traditional medicine, risk reduction and disaster preparedness, and other related environmental health issues. He is a member of Pesticide Committee under the Ministry of Agriculture, Republic of Indonesia since 2005. He is also the Head of Indonesian Public Health Education Institution Networking (INDOPHEIN) and the President of Indonesian Environmental Health Specialist Association (IEHSA) since 2009.



He actively attends AWI meetings as the representative of the President of University of Indonesia, and annual meetings of the Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health (APACPH) and the South East Asia Public Health Education (SEAPHEIN) since FPHUI is a member of both organizations.

Institute of Occupational Medicine and Industrial Hygiene

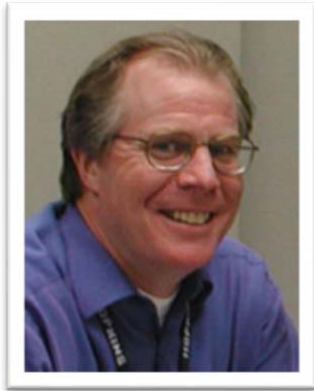
Dr. Chan, Director of International Health Center in Taiwan, College of Public Health, National Taiwan University (since 2007) has over 70 conference papers and project reports related to environment, health, risk assessment, environmental management, and international health which were funded by Taiwan EPA, Taiwan DOH, National Research Council, Ministry of Economic Development, Council of Labor, National Health Research Institute, Taipei City, Kaoshung City, Taipei County and private companies. He has also over 60 scientific papers in English on health, environment and labor issues which have been published in Scientific Citation Indexed (SCI) journals. He received his Doctor of Science majoring in Air Pollution Control from Harvard School of Public Health in 1990.



Doe Mayer

University of Southern California

She holds the Mary Pickford Chair at USC's School of Cinematic Arts where she teaches documentary and fiction filmmaking. She holds a joint appointment with the Annenberg School for Communication & Journalism where her work is centered on the practical application of communication campaign strategies and designs for social issue and health-defined organizations. Professor Mayer has been working in film and television for the past 25 years and has produced, directed and provided technical support for hundreds of productions in the United States and numerous developing countries. Much of this programming has been in the areas of family planning, basic education, health and nutrition promotion, HIV/AIDS prevention, population, and women's issues. She completed a project called Women Connect! in 2005, an initiative of the Pacific Institute for Women's Health that is funded through the Annenberg Center for Communication at USC and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The project sought to strengthen African women NGOS (Non-Governmental Organizations) to use communication strategies in media and technology to improve women's health and well-being. She received the Associates' Award for Excellence in Teaching, USC's top teaching award, for the 2009-2010 school year.



James M. Tielsch

Department of International Health
Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health

James M. Tielsch, Ph.D. is Professor and Associate Chair for Academic Programs in the Department of International Health at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. He was originally trained in molecular biology and then completed both Masters and doctoral training in epidemiology at Johns Hopkins University. His current research focuses on the epidemiology and control of maternal and child health problems in low income countries including a randomized trials of cookstove replacement for prevention of pneumonia and adverse reproductive outcomes, sunflower oil versus mustard oil for infant emollient massage for prevention of neonatal sepsis and mortality, and maternal influenza immunization for prevention of influenza in mothers and infants. All these trials are being conducted in southern Nepal. He has worked extensively in India, Nepal, Indonesia, the Philippines, Malawi and Zanzibar. He teaches courses on global health at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. He has published more than 260 papers in the peer-reviewed scientific literature and over 50 other papers, book chapters, and monographs.



Jim Falk

Director, Australian Centre for Science (ACSIS)
Innovation and Society Convener, Climate Adaptation Science and Policy Initiative, University of Melbourne

Professor Jim Falk is Director of ACSIS. His Ph.D is in theoretical physics, and over the last 25 years he has specialised in the study of the nature, impact and management of science and technology in their social contexts. His research has focused particularly on issues associated with globalisation, technological change and the environment, nuclear technology, arms races and militarisation, and information and communication technology in their social settings. He is the author or co-author of over 100 scholarly papers and 5 books. Prior to taking up his current position, Professor Falk was Deputy Vice-Chancellor at Victoria University, Pro Vice-Chancellor (Academic) at the University of Western Sydney, Nepean, and prior to that, Chair of the Academic Senate and Head of the Department of Science and Technology Studies at the University of Wollongong. He remains an Emeritus Professor of the University of Wollongong.



Joel Negin

Sydney School of Public Health

He is Senior Lecturer in International Public Health at the School of Public Health at the University of Sydney and a Research Fellow at the Menzies Centre for Health Policy. He maintains an ongoing appointment at the Earth Institute at Columbia University where he previously worked on the Millennium Villages Project. Joel's research focuses on multi-sectoral development models and health systems strengthening in sub-Saharan Africa and the Pacific. Joel has worked in a number of countries including Kenya, Côte d'Ivoire, Liberia, Zimbabwe, Botswana and South Africa on various health and development projects for UN agencies, government departments and academic institutions. He holds a Master's in International Affairs from Columbia University and a first degree from Harvard University.



Jonathan M. Samet

Department of Preventive Medicine at the Keck School of Medicine
University of Southern California

He, a pulmonary physician and epidemiologist, is currently Professor and Flora L. Thornton Chair for the Department of Preventive Medicine at the Keck School of Medicine at the University of Southern California and Director, USC Institute for Global Health. He received an A.B. degree in chemistry and physics from Harvard College, before receiving the MD degree from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. He also has an MS in epidemiology from the Harvard School of Public Health. Dr. Samet has investigated diverse health issues using epidemiological approaches. His research has focused on the health risks of inhaled pollutants—particles and ozone in outdoor air and indoor pollutants including secondhand smoke and radon. He has also investigated the occurrence and causes of cancer and respiratory diseases, emphasizing the risks of active and passive smoking. He has served on numerous committees concerned with using scientific evidence for the development of policy to protect public health. He was a member of the Biological Effects of Ionizing Radiation (BEIR) IV Committee and Chair of BEIR VI. He currently chairs the Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and also the FDA's Tobacco Products Scientific Advisory Committee. He was appointed to the National Cancer Advisory Board in 2010. Dr. Samet received the Surgeon General's Medallion in 1990 and 2006, the 2004 Prince Mahidol Award for Global Health awarded by the King of Thailand, and the 2006 Public Service Award of the American Thoracic Society. He was elected to the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences in 1997.



Judith McCool

University of Auckland

Judith has been an active contributor to research in the field of tobacco control and non-communicable disease prevention since 1998. Judith has been the lead investigator on numerous research projects funded by the Health Research Council and National Heart Foundation and an active co-investigator on other research projects. On the basis of her expertise on youth and media, Judith is regularly invited to comment on tobacco issues in the media, with the most recent based on her research on youth perceptions of plain packaging. Since being appointed to lecturer in global health, Judith has developed networks throughout wider Asia Pacific region and South America, where she participates in regional meetings, conferences and forums for global health and tobacco control. The Global Health Group, led by Judith, been awarded a Vice Chancellor's Strategic Development Award (2009) and an International Research Team Development Award (2010) to enhance international global health collaboration. Judith is the coordinator of research fellowship initiative between the School of Population Health and the Fiji School of Medicine. Current research interests include an assessment of the impact of trade on health outcomes (child health, NCDs) and tobacco industry behaviours in the Pacific region. Judith teaches global health with the Master of Public Health programme, is primary supervisor on several global health related projects and was guest editor for the Asia Pacific Journal of Public Health, Special Issue on Pacific Health (2011).



Masamine Jimba

Department of Community and Global Health
Graduate School of Medicine
The University of Tokyo

He graduated in March 1985 from Hamamatsu University School of Medicine, Shizuoka, Japan (Medical Degree). In March 1989, he received his Master's Degree in Public Health from The National Institute of Public Health, Tokyo, Japan. In July 1995, he received his Ph.D from Hamamatsu University School of Medicine, Shizuoka, Japan. He has been a professor at the Department of International Community Health, Graduate School of Medicine, The University of Tokyo since June 2006.



Phua Kai Hong

Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy
National University of Singapore

He was previously Associate Professor and Head, Health Care Division and Head, Health Services Research Unit, Department of Community, Occupational & Family Medicine, Faculty of Medicine and Adjunct Senior Fellow at the Institute of Policy Studies, Singapore. He graduated with honours *cum laude* from Harvard University and received graduate degrees from the Harvard School of Public Health (Master's in Health Services Administration & Population Sciences) and the London School of Economics & Political Science (Ph.D in Social Administration specializing in Health Economics). He was the recipient of a Harvard College Scholarship, the Sigma Scholarship from the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, Harvard University, and an NUS Overseas Graduate Scholarship. Dr. Phua received The Outstanding Young Person (TOYP) award in 1992 for his contributions to health policy and community service in Singapore. He was a past Vice-Chairman of the Singapore Red Cross, served on the Board of Management of the Home Nursing Foundation and was a founder Council Member and Chairman, Resource Committee of the Gerontological Society. He was Chairman of the Task Force on Social Services 2015, to develop a strategic plan for the National Council of Social Service. He was appointed on many national advisory committees, including the Government Parliamentary Committee Resource Panel on Health (1988-1996, 2007-current). Dr. Phua is the co-lead and corresponding author of the overview article in the Lancet Series on Health in Southeast Asia (2011). He leads the health systems component in a Rockefeller-funded project on Asian Trends Monitoring awarded to the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy and the Institute of Strategic Futures. He also serves on the Academic Committee of the NUS Initiative to Improve Health in Asia (NIHA) Leadership Program.



Rachmadi Purwana

Department of Environmental Health
Faculty of Public Health, Universitas Indonesia

Rachmadhi received his medical degree from the Faculty of Medicine, University of Indonesia in 1972 and his Master's Degree in Public Health in 1974. He received his Ph.D in Public Health from the Faculty of Public Health, University of Indonesia in 1999. His newest publications are focused on sanitation namely, "A Road Map to Support Country-level Implementation of Water Safety Plans" and "Water Safety Plan Manual, Step-by-step risk management for drinking-water suppliers" which have been translated and published by WHO in 2011.



Richard Drobnick

Director, Center for International Business Education and Research
Marshall School of Business, University of Southern California
Managing Director, APRU World Initiative

Dr. Drobnick is the founding director of the Center for International Business Education and Research (CIBER) at the Marshall School of Business, which has been supported by the U.S. Department of Education since 1990, as one of its 33 national resource centers on international business. From 1994 to 2005, Drobnick served as USC's inaugural Vice Provost for International Affairs. Drobnick is also the Managing Director of the APRU World Initiative, which was developed in 2006 to produce interdisciplinary research on issues of critical importance to Pacific Rim policy makers (www.apru.org/awi). Drobnick was the first Secretary General and a former member of the Steering Committee of the Association of Pacific Rim Universities (APRU), an association of presidents of 42 leading Pacific Rim research universities (www.apru.org). Drobnick is a member of the United States Asia Pacific Council, which is the organizing institution for the United States National Committee of the Pacific Economic Cooperation Council (PECC), a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, a member of the Executive Committee of the Advisory Council of the Asia Society's Southern California Center, and a director of the Japan-America Society of Southern California. From 1967 to 1969, Drobnick served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Malaysia, as a management advisor to the "Farmer Associations" that were being launched by the Malaysian Department of Agriculture.



Sian M. Griffiths

Director of the School of Public Health and Primary Care, Faculty of
Medicine, The Chinese University of Hong Kong

Professor Griffiths is the Director of the School of Public Health and Primary Care. Qualified as a doctor in the UK, she has held a variety of service posts with academic links at international, national, regional and local level whilst based in the UK including Chair of the Association for Public Health, co-founded the UKPHA and President of the UK Faculty of Public Health. In 2003 she co-chaired the Hong Kong Government's expert committee into the SARS epidemic. This led to her present appointment as Professor and Director of Public Health and Primary Care in the Chinese University of Hong Kong. In July 2010 she was made a JP by the HKSAR government, in recognition of her contribution to health care in Hong Kong. Over the next few months she will be speaking at a wide range of conferences including giving the Milroy lecture at the Royal College of Physicians and the keynote speech for the Medical Women's Federation. She has recently taken on responsibility as Senior Adviser on International Academic Development for CUHK, focusing on UK links.



Sung-il Cho

Associate Professor, Graduate School of Public Health
Seoul National University

Sung-il Cho is Associate Professor of Epidemiology at Graduate School of Public Health, Seoul National University (SNU). He graduated from College of Medicine, SNU, and received M.P.H. in epidemiology from Graduate School of Public Health, SNU. He received Sc.D. degree in epidemiology and environmental health from Harvard School of Public Health, USA. He has been a faculty member since 2001 at SNU Graduate School of Public Health, and served from 2008 to 2010 as Associate Dean at the Office of International Affairs, SNU. Dr. Cho's major research interest includes aging and chronic diseases, work stress and health, and social determinants of health. He is conducting yearly community-based surveys in Seoul to monitor chronic diseases and their determinants, and serves in an advisory committee for Korea CDC on National Health and Nutrition Survey, in the areas of physical activity and smoking. He is currently President of Korean Society of Occupational Stress. He published numerous articles in various international journals including Social Science and Medicine, American Journal of Public Health, International Journal of Epidemiology, Diabetes Care, and Journal of Gerontology.



Tetsuya Mizoue

Director of Department of Epidemiology and Prevention, Research Institute, International Medical Center of Japan

He graduated from University of Occupational and Environmental Health, Japan (UOEH) and School of Medicine. He worked in the Department of Clinical Epidemiology at UOEH as a research associate from 1994 to 2002 and as an associate professor at the Department of Preventive Medicine, Kyushu University from 2002 to 2006. He has served as the Director of Department of Epidemiology and Prevention, Research Institute, International Medical Center of Japan since 2006. His research focuses on lifestyle-related diseases (colorectal cancer, diabetes, metabolic syndrome), epidemiology, occupational health, preventive medicine, and school health.



Nguyen Thanh Huong

Chair of Institutional Ethical Review Board

Member of Training and Scientific Committee, Hanoi School of Public Health

Dr. Huong has over 20 years of experiences in teaching, research and providing consultancy in public health area across several major disciplines such as health policy and planning, health promotion, and health system. She is Head of Social Sciences, Behavior and Health Education Faculty and head of Health Policy and Law Departments. She holds BSc, MSc degrees from Hanoi School of Pharmacy and MPH degree from the University of Adelaide, Australia and Ph.D from Queensland University of Technology, Australia. She has been in charge of developing and coordinating a number of curricula such as Health Policy, Health Policy Communication, Health Promotion, Social Marketing, Health Psychology, Public Health Ethics and Mixed Method Research in Hanoi School of Public Health (HSPH). Dr. Huong has been coordinating and involving in a number of research projects at HSPH, particularly adolescent health, evaluation of health policies, mental health and intervention, burden of disease. She has been a coordinator and facilitator for some short-courses on Health Economics, Health Management, Health Policy Communication and Advocacy, Health Promotion Evaluation, Social Marketing, Mixed Methods Research.
